
To offer children and youth hope for a better future and the opportunities for them to develop to their full potential.

Every day the lives of our children are in danger

More than 380,900 children under the age of 18 grow up in marginalized environments that do not promote a positive development. These children live in families without economic stability, lacking good nutrition, without opportunities for quality education and employment, in unsafe environments and lacking supportive relationships.


less than a quarter of the median in Mississippi (\$ 51,732), the poorest state in the United States.

*This means that our children live in households with incomes below the federal poverty live (according to the United States Census Bureau), incomes of \$11,756 for individuals over 65 years of age and \$24,858 for a family of two adults and two children.

Success Story

Christian began attending the Boys & Girls Club of Puerto Rico in his community located in Ernesto Ramos Antonini Public Housing when he was eight years old. "I was a naughty and restless child back then, just like many kids that age. At the Club, I learned to be more disciplined, respect public spaces and realized that my actions have consequences", he reflects. Since then, Christian developed his leadership skills and learned the responsibility it entails to be seen as a role model. Becoming his Club's Youth of the Year in 2009 pushed him further in that direction and increased his compromise of representing the youth from his community and take them the message of the opportunities that lie beyond the violent setting that used to be the norm.

Some time after this, he was admitted into the University of the Sacred Heart to major in Film Production and Photography. "The leaders of the Club helped me with the admission process and provided support through my college years. My mother raised five children on her own, she worked too hard to sustain us and couldn't help me in this process as she hoped", recalls Christian, the first in his family to obtain a degree.

The accomplishment of achieving his goal was even greater as Christian somehow also fulfilled his fathers dream, who was not able to finish his studies at the same university. "Every time I saw him, he would encourage me to give my all and advised me throughout the years... He wanted a
